Fire Department Accountability Review

Attached you'll find the Accountability Review for August. Items to note are the slight drop in call volume in July due to the mild temperatures and rainfall we have had this summer. In July, 2018 there were 90 brush files, this July there were only 21. Response time has been reduced in both the City and Rural District. In the city the average response time was 5:22 and in the district 8:34. Compliments to the Bend Fire Department on a job well done.

Affordable Housing in Bend

In partnership with the Meyer Memorial Trust and the NW Credit Union Foundation, the credit union association has created a new affordable housing program to be released in Central Oregon. This new program will help with the initial deposit families need as well as first and last month rent. The attached flyer will give you an idea of the details presented in this new loan program.

The Pew Charitable Trusts put out an article in their Stateline written by Erika Bolstad titled, *Affordable Housing Pus Challenges Single-Family Zoning.* This article is centered around Bend's affordable housing and how Bend has made zoning changes to make affordable housing possible, "What was done in Bend has now become a model." Moody's Annual Comment Report

Last Friday Moody's released their annual comment report on the water revenue bonds. Most of the credit metrics remain stable or improved, with the exception of two that weakened slightly since the prior year, but are still higher than the US median. This is the financial narrative from the report: *Financial Strength:* The financial position of Bend Water is strong and is favorable relative to its Aa2 rating. The days cash on hand (1,489 days) is excellent and greatly exceeds the US median, and it has improved significantly between 2014 and 2018. In addition, the coverage of the annual debt service by net revenues (2.3x) is solid and above other Moody's-rated water systems nationwide. Lastly, the debt to operating revenues (3.1x) is high and greater than the US median.

BEDAB Update from Ben Hemson

Is a Recession Brewing?

If you own stock in any publicly traded company you likely noticed the sharp market dive earlier this week on the news of <u>a yield curve inversion</u>, a consistent (yet not always accurate) warning of an impending recession. If, like me, you understand these sort of things better with the help of sports analogies, here's an article <u>detailing how inversions</u> work from *The New York Times*.

Of course, even if a recession does happen, the impact on Bend or Oregon could be wildly different from the last time around. Bend was relatively untroubled by the 2001 recession while the 2008 edition remains top of mind today. I've been hunting around for some local or regional analysis on what a recession could mean here, so far I haven't found anything great but here are a couple of articles from University of Oregon Economist, Tim Duy, about this week's events: "Don't Panic. Yet" and a follow up blog post from yesterday, "This is what I'm talking about".

Urban Renewal Advisory Board Sets Draft Boundary

The Urban Renewal Advisory Board (URAB) met this week to continue their work on identifying a potential new urban renewal area in the Bend Central District and areas adjacent to it. Before the group identifies the projects that an urban renewal area would build over time, they need to drill down on just what the boundary will look like.

At their meeting, the URAB unanimously approved a draft boundary that you <u>can find on</u> page 47 of the meeting packet available here. The group did make one minor change, expanding the boundary along Wall Street to include the Wall Street Storage site.

Council Subcommittee on Community Building

I've mentioned the <u>City Council Subcommittees</u> in previous updates. The Stewardship Committee is looking at the Climate Action Plan, among other items and the BEDAB is one of the assigned City boards tasked with participating, we'll chat about this a little bit at Monday's meeting.

The other Council Subcommittee, the Community Building Committee, is looking at various development related issues, including:

- Development Code Audit
- Policies to streamline housing projects
- Alternative housing models (such as tiny homes)
- Land use planning for Opportunity Areas
- Neighborhood Traffic Safety Plan
- Sidewalk plan

With housing a priority in the <u>BEDAB Strategic Plan</u>, some of these may be relevant to issues BEDAB will weigh in on in the future. The next Community Building meeting is scheduled for Monday, August 26th from 3-5 pm in Council Chambers, feel free to attend. I'll be there and you can expect an update at a future BEDAB meeting.

Childcare Update

As you know, finding ways to get new childcare slots in Bend has been a focus lately. Today we finalized a certificate of occupancy with a childcare provider, School of Enrichment, for their new location on Butler Market Road. This allows them to maintain their current student enrollment of about 50 while adding another 20-30 new slots.

The location had a number of challenges around infrastructure and frontage improvements, staff in Community Development were able to find some ways to reduce their costs or give the school an extended timeline to complete some of these projects. This turned out to help enough to make the project work. <u>Here's a picture</u> of the School's happy and relieved owner, Katie Brandow, picking up the COO this morning, an hour before her final inspection with the state. The school is scheduled to open up on Monday at their new location.

Legislative Update at BEDAB

The City's contract lobbyist in Salem, Erik Kancler, will provide a legislative update on this year's state session and relevant bills at BEDAB's meeting on Monday, September 9th. I've had a few of you ask questions about housing related policies that came out of the session, this should be a good chance to ask questions. If you know of anyone that may have an interest feel free to invite them to attend, Erik will be up first, right around noon.



TOTAL EMERGENCY CALLS FOR SERVICE 2019-2020




EMERGENCY RESPONSE TIMES 2019-2020












TOTAL MEDICAL INCIDENTS 2019-2020


EMERGENCY MEDICAL RESPONSE TIMES 2019-2020
