### Police Update

Downtown merchants have been saying this year felt different with regards to the crime and need to call for Police assistance. Chief Porter had Crimes Analyst Nancy Watson pull the calls for service and crime stats for the downtown area, between Memorial Day and Labor Day. The combination of the exclusion zone, the Community Enhancement Program (CEP) patrols, evening foot patrols, the Information Led Policing (ILP) team led by Sargent Landolt, Captain Burleigh's Mental Health team, the redesign of the Mirror Pond south, and aggressive patrols in Drake Park have produced result any City would be proud of.

Points for calls for service in the Downtown area between Memorial Day through Labor Day for 2017, 2018 and 2019:

- There were increases in the number of traffic stops and CEP contacts TS = 14.4%, CEP = 7.8%
- Unwanted Subjects calls fell 20.9%
- Intoxicated Subject calls fell 45.7%
- Animal Control/Complaint calls fell 19%
- Mental Health & Suicidal calls fell 38.6%
- Assault and dispute calls combined fell 40% (Assault =74.1%, Dispute = 15.8%, Domestic Disputes = 61.9%)
- Theft case reports fell by 59.6%
- Trespassing case reports fell from 15 to 7 (down 53.3%)

## **BEDAB Update from Ben Hemson**

### Council Childcare Work Session Next Wednesday

At next week's Council work session we will be discussing efforts to increase childcare supply in town and what additional options may be available at the local level for Councilors to consider. Adding childcare slots in Bend is a component of the current <u>BEDAB Strategic Plan</u>, so you can expect to hear the results of the conversation and next steps.

Along with City staff, Katy Brooks from the Chamber of Commerce will cover their childcare initiative and working group and representatives from the School of Enrichment, a recently relocated childcare, will cover the challenges they faced during their project.

### Council Stewardship Subcommittee on 9/23

I mentioned this at the BEDAB meeting on Monday, but a reminder here that we're looking for a BEDAB representative to participate in the next <u>Council Stewardship</u> <u>Subcommittee</u> meeting in Council Chambers on Monday, September 23<sup>rd</sup> from 3:30-5 pm. The Climate Action Plan will feature on the agenda and BEDAB has initial feedback that I can help anyone distill down into key points before participating.

The Council Subcommittees are shaping up to be a bit of a clearinghouse for policy discussions at the City, so ensuring BEDAB participation is important as the Board works on its priorities in the strategic plan.

### **Deschutes County Wage Growth & Housing**

At this morning's Habitat for Humanity Build It Breakfast at the Riverhouse, Damon Runberg covered the challenges surrounding home affordability in Bend. Damon's key points likely won't come as any surprise to any of you; a key driver of increasing costs is that <u>we still aren't building enough homes locally</u> to keep up with population growth. During his talk, Damon did mention that Deschutes County wage growth has outstripped the state as a whole over the past half-decade. This has had a (minor) moderating effect on the rise in home prices. The Oregon Office of Economic Analysis has a good blog post on the topic of state and county wage growth from just last week, <u>you can read it here</u>.

### Events of Interest

<u>The Outdoor City USA</u> event at Mt. Bachelor is happening as I type this and runs all weekend. As mentioned in a previous update, along with plenty of bike races this is shaping up to be a big networking event for the cycling industry. Outdoor City is coming back to Mt.
